Altus AFB, Oklahoma (Altus AFB ASYMCA)

The Altus ASYMCA had a very successful year, and anticipate even better years ahead with the BRAC commission's review renewing local confidence in our community. The local board and staff are deeply committed to, and involved in, every aspect of the partner member campaign.

We continue to add ASYMCA programs for our young families: the new Vernon Lewis Bible Study for Junior Enlisted Airmen Training for Deployment; the Kid Comfort Quilts which are being made for Holiday distribution; Morale Days for Junior Enlisted Airmen Training for Deployment and their families; and our Enlisted Spouses Weekly Social is serving approximately 100 people each month.

In 2007 we promoted our Altus ASYMCA programs at numerous community events, including "First Term Airmen" monthly, where the new military members are welcomed to their first duty station at a reception immediately following their graduation.

Attendees at our events and workshops number 13,824, with total contacts through the year at 34,361. It is critical that we continue to support our airmen and their families. We are grateful for our community's support and encouragement as we continue our mission of "Serving Those Who Serve America!"



Anchorage, Alaska (ASYMCA of Alaska)

TOGETH2007 was a monumental year for the Armed Services YMCA of Alaska. We've seen the successful institution of several programs as well as the continued development of already established activities.



The Heroes Home – a program that provides safe, comfortable housing at no cost to the families of seriously ill, wounded, or fallen military – welcomed its first family in August. Between August and December 2007, 18 families were assisted with this program.

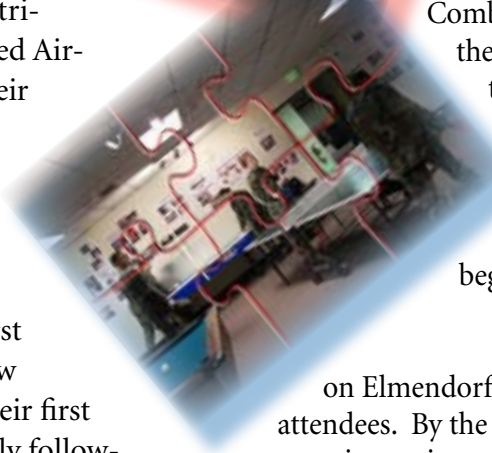
This year also saw the inaugural Combat Fishing Tournament that provided the opportunity for 60 military members to take an Alaskan fishing charter.

Our transportation program has also seen tremendous growth over the past year – there have been over 40,000 riders served since it began in 2006.

Our D.H. Cuddy Welcome Center on Elmendorf AFB has seen an increase in monthly attendees. By the end of December 2007, the Center was seeing an increase from 30 to 403 military members each month use the facility.

The W.I.C. program operated out of Ft. Richardson and the Elmendorf AFB Hospital is recognized as Alaska's fastest growing W.I.C. program with the lowest rate of early childhood obesity.

Also, the ASYMCA of Alaska hosted its first annual Father Daughter Dance with over 300 military fathers and daughters in attendance.



Bremerton, Washington (Kitsap Family YMCA)

Naval Base Kitsap is host to more than 60 tenant commands in Bremerton, Bangor and Keyport, Washington. In 2007, more than 300 local service men and women chose membership in the Kitsap Family YMCA for our family-centered activities and to expand their network of friends within the Kitsap community.

Last year we provided on-site child care services to approximately 350 children of military families each month – more than 70 percent of all children served. This included our popular Childwatch for children of YMCA members; and drop-in pre-school, newly expanded to five days a week.

We also provided before- and after-school child care at six school sites, serving students from 21 schools throughout the Bremerton and Central Kitsap areas; with day camps during the summer months. One program rapidly growing in popularity is Military Date Night, a monthly opportunity for military couples to drop off their children for an evening of activities while they enjoy a much-needed night out together. Our child care services are among the most reasonably priced in the area, and in 2007 we offered over \$168,000 in scholarship support to enable children of low-income families to take advantage of these programs.

We are committed to serving the military population of the Kitsap community, with membership discounts and full access to our award-winning Friday Teen Late Night (for ages 13-19) and monthly Splash & Jam for children of all ages.

El Paso, Texas (Fort Bliss ASYMCA)

During Summer Camp '07, over 40 children benefited from ASYMCA activities. From crafts to baseball, young minds were stimulated and physical fitness encouraged.

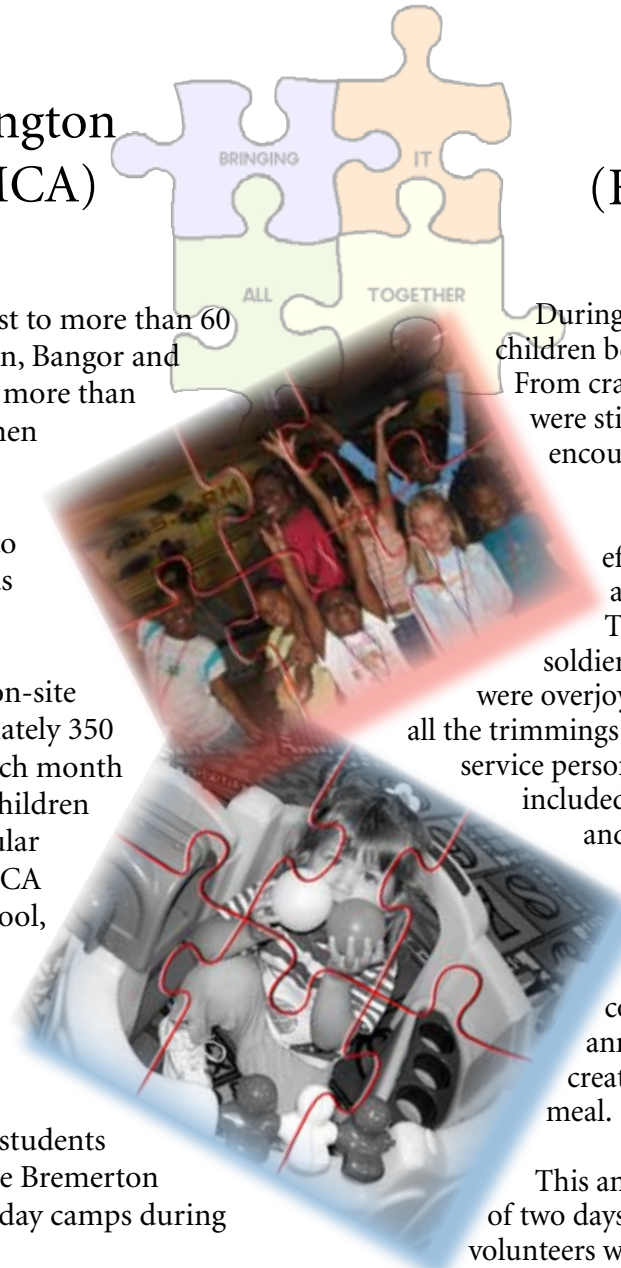
Thanks to the great collaborative efforts of volunteers and staff at the Fort Bliss ASYMCA and TEAM BLISS, over 1,020 of our soldiers and their family members were overjoyed to receive a turkey ... and all the trimmings for Thanksgiving. Military service personnel benefiting from the program included Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force and Texas National Guard from Ft. Bliss, White Sands and Las Cruces.

Each year many volunteers contribute to the success of this annual drive to assist families in creating the perfect Thanksgiving Day meal.

This annual event is held over a period of two days and from sunrise to sunset, volunteers work diligently to assure that every bag is filled with everything it takes to complete a Thanksgiving Day Feast. 2007 was the 3rd year the Thanksgiving basket drive was held at the Fort Bliss/El Paso ASYMCA.

Volunteers from BOSS, the NCO Wives Club, the Purple Heart Association, church groups, local teenagers and of course our ever helpful volunteers of the Fort Bliss ASYMCA and Junior Enlisted Family Center have contributed to the program with unwavering support. It is because of the priceless contributions these individuals make to the ASYMCA that the Thanksgiving Baskets program is a success.

During Christmas we distributed 250 toys in conjunction with the Texas National Guard to children in Ft. Bliss through the Woman's Day Operation Holiday Joy program at the JEFC. Staff and volunteers alike look forward to 2008!



Fayetteville, North Carolina (Fort Bragg/Pope AFB ASYMCA)

“Serving those who Serve America” had more meaning than ever in 2007! With approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ of our soldiers and airmen deployed, our ASYMCA branch worked continuously to provide quality programs for the families of these soldiers. Knowing that their spouses and children were well cared for enabled them to concentrate on their mission without the added stress of wondering how their families were coping.

Our Artist in Residence Program brought storyteller Gail Nelson to us in April and author Dr. Crystal Ball O'Connor in September. Both guests delighted more than 3,000 children, teachers and parents at Fort Bragg schools. The Mother/Daughter Tea & Fashion Show was sold out again, and word of the Kloset has brought in many excited women, along with more donations of formal dresses. Approximately 1,200 children and parents celebrated Healthy Kid's Day with us, no doubt due to the added attraction of the climbing wall, Home Depot and their “take home” projects, and the ever popular – Dr. “The Snakeman” Waddle.

With the generous donation from the California Community Foundation, we were able to obtain a second bus this summer, which enabled us to increase our numbers in our Summer Adventure Camp. The children spent a whirlwind few months participating in two field trips and two swimming outings each week. Eight children of deployed parents were also afforded the opportunity to attend overnight camp for one week, through Operation Purple. The children attending our Exceptional Family Member Summer Camp had the thrill of a lifetime when six members of the Fayetteville Swampdogs baseball team spent a morning with them playing ball at their stadium. Three of the Swampdogs have since been drafted by Major League teams.

Our 5th Annual Junior Enlisted Golf Outing had the largest turn out since we began. More than 100 young men and women, recently back from deployment, were able to come out to golf, eat and win prizes for free! A record 36 sponsors made the event possible. We finished out the year with our Holiday Hearts Program, again serving more than 400 children in our military community. Partnerships with Army Community Service, Women's Day, Military Affairs Council, Officers' Spouses' Club, Campbell University, Duke Physical Therapy and the Pinkus Family made this “the best Christmas ever” for many families.

We are now looking forward to a great 2008!

Fort Campbell, Kentucky (Fort Campbell ASYMCA)

Our weekly Bible Study began in March. We have a wonderful civilian pastor who leads these discussions each week and touches the lives of so many of our Soldiers. The number of participants has grown tremendously. They meet each Tuesday and lunch is provided so they receive both physical and spiritual nourishment.

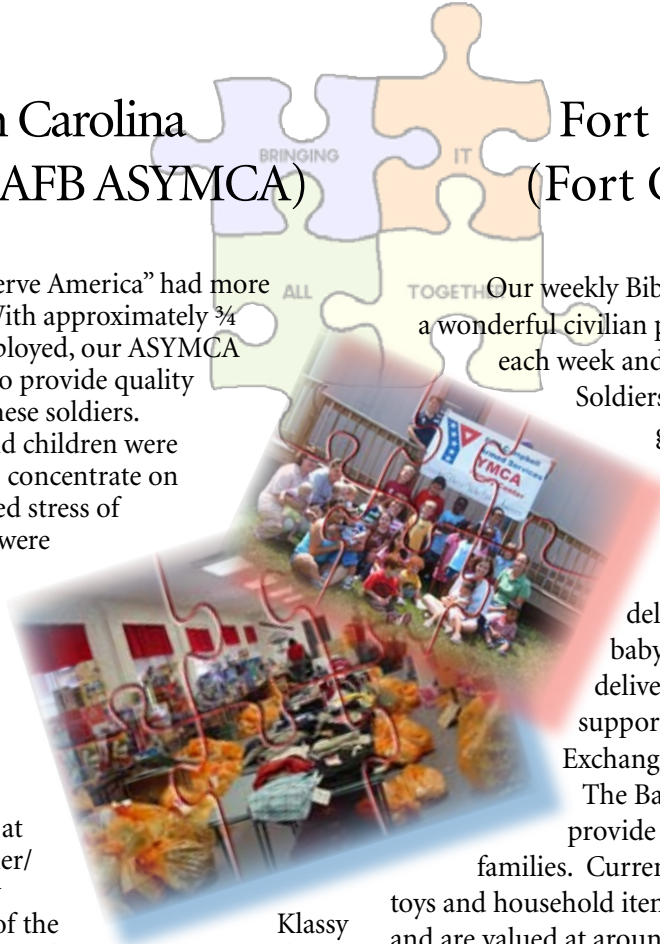
Starting mid-June, we began delivering a baby bundle to each new baby born on post. The total bundles delivered for 2007 was 14,273. Without the support of our local Commissary and Post Exchange this program would not be possible. The BackDoor Boutique continues to provide assistance to our E-5 and below families. Currently our donations of clothes, shoes, toys and household items average 250-300 each month and are valued at around \$20,000. With support from the Commissary we are able to provide food and diaper assistance to families in need. This program assisted over 12,000 families this past year.

Whether it's our Easter Egg hunt to our Christmas party (with over 180 in attendance) or just a spaghetti dinner our monthly family events have become very popular. The attendance at these events continues to grow each month.

Our coop day care has become an important part of so many young spouses' lives. It is a place to meet and make new friends, as well as a clean and inviting place to bring their children plus an opportunity for them to do something for themselves, like go to college, without the expense of childcare.

With over 15,000 of our Soldiers currently deployed and 5,000 more to leave in the next few months, the need for our services increases daily. As the 2007 Holiday Season approached we received assistance from the Woman's Day Operation Holiday Joy and other generous donors which helped make this time much brighter for over 100 military families.

As you can see the Armed Services YMCA here at Ft Campbell, KY has been very busy this past year. This could not have been possible without our many wonderful volunteers. Just as the enlisted Soldier is the backbone of the Army, these volunteers are the life blood of this Armed Services YMCA. These dedicated volunteers, along with our limited staff, work tirelessly each day to help us continue to “Serve those who Serve America.”



Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri (Pulaski County ASYMCA)

The Armed Services YMCA of Pulaski County experienced a year of transition in 2007. Our long time Executive Director retired from her position after 20+ years and a new Director came on board.

After we updated our computer systems and internet access, we set about increasing our presence on Ft. Leonard Wood. We made “desk side” presentations to new or returning Commanders on post. This enabled us to “sing the praises” of the Y and the programs and services we offer. Cooperation with the local newspapers and radio stations brought us even more exposure throughout the surrounding communities. We made presentations at the monthly leadership meetings and also the Rotary Club.

Ft. Leonard Wood continues to grow in scope and we have seen an 11% increase in attendance for our programs. We partner with the New Parent Support Group and Parent’s as Teachers to present two playgroups each week. A Mom & Me craft class, held each week, has grown to be a place to socialize, exchange stories, meet newcomers to post and, of course, do a craft with your child. We need a larger space!!!

We tried several new programs this year. Our “Strollin’ with the Y” is a walking program around one of the local parks. An enrichment program for Middle School students allowed us to introduce horses and riding. The six week program proved to be a favorite among the students. The arrival of our new 14 passenger bus, in October, opened up a new area of services for us. We have initiated Y bus trips to various local attractions. We enjoyed the Holiday season by visiting several drive through light displays. We also had a “Cookie Express” on two consecutive Fridays. Each day, we made 20 stops, on and off Ft. Leonard Wood, delivering cookies, songs, good wishes and our sincere appreciation at each stop. Volunteers dressed in holiday attire and all had a wonderful time!

We look forward to 2008 as a year to continue to grow in service to our community. We are proud that through our partner members and fund raising efforts, our programs are free and open to the public.

Honolulu, Hawaii (Honolulu ASYMCA)

In 2007, Honolulu Armed Services YMCA Board and staff bid Aloha to Executive Director, Dave Gomez, who was relocating to Alaska. The new Executive Director, John Bates, USMC (Ret), is committed to serving Hawaii’s active duty personnel and their military families. With fewer than three weeks on the job, John had served as Master of Ceremonies at the Essay Contest Awards Presentation, attended the Annual Father Daughter Dance, and met with the Easter Bunny at several ASYMCA family programs!

Funding shortfalls for the Army’s Family Advocacy Program have impacted childbirth education classes, home visitation programs for expectant and new parents, and playgroups for moms and infants. At Family Advocacy’s request, we picked up the Infant Playgroup at Aliamanu and referrals to the Welcome Baby program.

Mokulele Elementary School on Hickam AFB became an Operation Hero site thanks to a Mokulele teacher who had become familiar with the Honolulu ASYMCA through our Annual Essay

Contest, encouraged the school’s principal to meet with us to discuss Operation Hero. The meeting resulted in a new OpHero program serving Air Force and Navy dependents at Hickam.

The pace of deployments continued to increase for all branches of the military in Hawaii. Most of our families have felt the impact of having loved ones sent to Iraq and Afghanistan. To better aid our community, ASYMCA staff received further training to help recognize signs of depression and abuse. Family strengthening tools have been incorporated into Playmorning, our popular parent/child program.



Jacksonville, North Carolina (Camp Lejeune ASYMCA)

Camp Lejeune Armed Services YMCA had a spectacular year in 2007. Since assuming management of the Ceramic Hobby Shop In 2005, we have increased awareness among the public while allowing over 2500 patrons to express their artistic ability.

Children are very excited to explore our artful atmosphere. From Birthday parties, baby showers, hand building, decorating and glazing. It seems to draw curious artist of all levels. Our ceramic shop allows you to create your own original works of art for yourself, as a gift or as a unique way to preserve a special memory. This opportunity has allowed the Branch to partner with our local community on numerous events which draws enthusiastic artist to our facility.

Participation in the Kids plus Program, Little Caterpillars interactive playgroup have motivated the Branch to expand other interactive play groups and art classes like crafty campers to accommodate the ever growing community. Our parent child classes serves as an outlet for moms experiencing the same stress of numerous deployments and for children to establish friends while fine tuning their motor skills and getting them kindergarten ready.

The Popular BackDoor Boutique is just that, the most popular program in our area. This has enabled Lejeune's ASYMCA to provide immediate assistance to over 500 Junior Enlisted families per month. Participation in this program has tripled with each and every month. Originally designed as a second hand children's clothing exchange program, it now provides support to the entire family. With the increase and demand for a variety of specialty items, we provide diapers, formula, household items, hygiene supplies, furniture and so much more for a small donation of \$5.00.

Other accomplishments include: sight For Students, Infant and Toddler car Seat Loan Program, Mom to Mom Hotline, Helping Hand, Angel Baskets, diaper Cakes, The Cropping corner, The Need to Bead, Women's Mission and the Volunteer Program. A dedicated staff and more than 21,298 Volunteer hours helped the Camp Lejeune ASYMCA serve 42,948 military service members and their families during 2007.

Killeen, Texas (Killeen ASYMCA)

During the 2007 year, the Killeen Armed Services YMCA experienced tremendous growth in its programs, particularly the School Aged Child Care Before and Afterschool and Day Camp Programs.

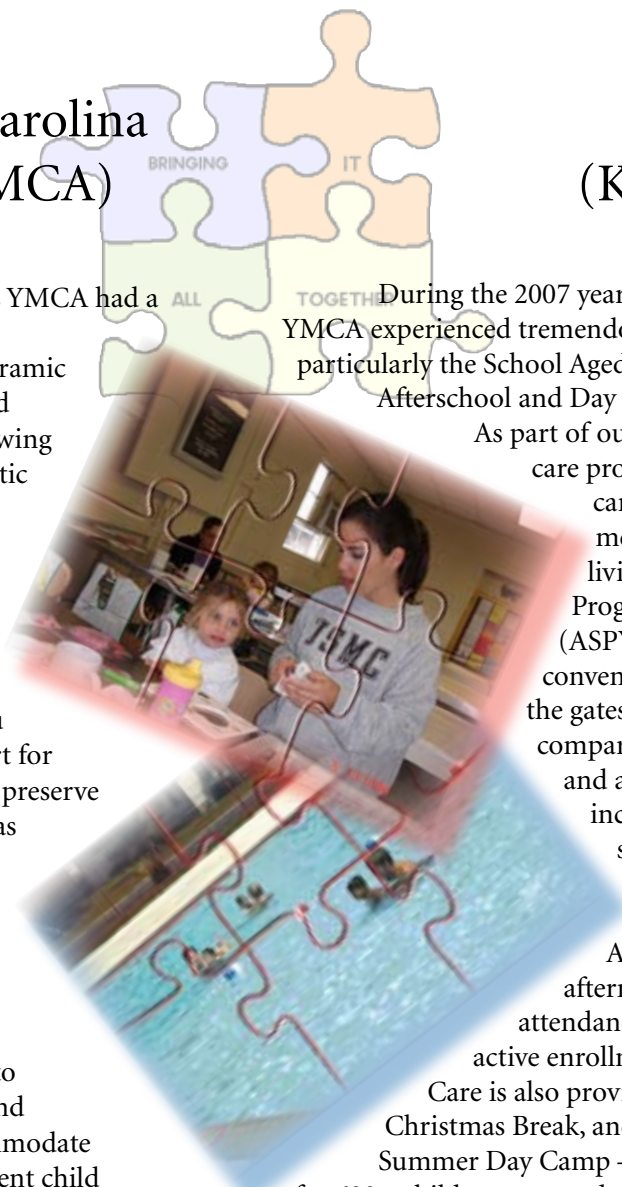
As part of our before and afterschool child care program, we are now offering care for children of service members and DOD civilians living off-base. Army School Age Programs in Your Neighborhood (ASPYN) care options are convenient for those living "outside the gates." Families pay reduced fees comparable to those charged on-post and are based on "total family" income. The Before and After school Program provide care in thirty elementary schools covering 3 school districts. All sites have morning and afternoon care, averaging a daily attendance of 1,200+ students and an active enrollment of over 1,800 students.

Care is also provided during Spring Break, Christmas Break, and Teacher In-Service Days. Summer Day Camp – Provide a safe, quality place for 600+ children to spend their summer while parents are at work. It is hosted from 6 am to 6 pm at five locations.

Family Readiness Group functions served over 1,500 soldiers and family members in 2007. Healthy Kids Day was held in May and attracted over 1,500 people. We have partnered with the Killeen/Heights Rotary Club to host a family event in conjunction with their annual Crawfish Boil and Catfish Fry. The Water Spray Park in Harker Heights attracted over 14,500 citizens of all ages this summer. Activities included recreational swimming, swim lessons, birthday parties, private parties for the community and family readiness groups, and use of the zero depth spray pad.

During the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, the YMCA donated toys to 1,750 children and 150 food baskets to military and civilian families, an effort we share with the help of our board members and The Santa Pals Program.

We had a very successful year of service with an average of about 5,891 people per month involved in our programs and activities. This could not have been accomplished if not for the outstanding work put in by our wonderful staff and dedicated volunteers.



Lawton/Fort Sill, Oklahoma (Lawton/Fort Sill ASYMCA)

In 2007 the Armed Services YMCA at Fort Sill began a Bravery Blanket program. A Bravery Blanket is a token of love and support given to children in war torn Tal-Afar, Iraq where a contingent of Fort Sill soldiers are stationed.

A Bravery Blanket is a large, soft, durable red blanket rolled up with two pretty hair ribbons. With each blanket a small stuffed animal; coloring book; crayons; and tooth brush and paste is also included.

A \$20 donation buys a blanket packet for a child in Tal-Afar. Each Tal-Afar Bravery Blanket is then matched by an ASYMCA supporter and the matching Blanket Packet is given to a child of a deployed soldier. Over 600 Bravery Blankets have been given away so far.

We have received tremendous financial assistance for this program from several sources Bravery Blanket has exposed the ASYMCA to many soldier families that were formerly unfamiliar with our programs and services. This awareness created tremendous growth in our all our programs such as Soldiers Closet (free clothing and household items); Food Closet (food assistance); Comfort Fund (direct financial help); Holiday Assistance (food baskets and presents); and transportation.

And, thanks to the Redwoods Group as well as the Lawton Community, for the sponsorship of the 1st/168th Helo Unit during RRSM, the Redwood Renegade Support Mission. Every soldier was supported with a monthly comfort box and a note of encouragement.

In 2007 we proudly served over 14,830 individuals who serve America.

Oak Harbor, Washington (Whidbey Island ASYMCA)

The GEICO Gecko and NASCAR #7 of Mike Wallace visited Oak Harbor and the Y summer program children got a great opportunity to see the car up close and personal. 45 children had the opportunity to see the car and set in the drivers seat if they wanted too. Even the GEICO Gecko got an opportunity to climb into the drivers seat, wonder where it got its driver's license? All the children were impressed and will look forward to watching the car perform this season on television.

November 2007 saw the National ASYMCA Board conduct its first board meeting in the Northwest in Seattle, Whidbey Island and Bremerton WA. It was great to have them here along with the staff that came with them. We think they had a good time and the weather cooperated. They visited the Whidbey Island Branch on November 1, 2007 and were greeted by the GEICO Gecko and our child development center children singing "God Bless America" to them. They toured our facility and them off to lunch at the CPO Club at NAS Whidbey where there was good interaction from our board and staff with them and one of our advisory board members CMD Chief "Bags" Bagarella, of NAS gave them a great brief on the future of NAS Whidbey Island. It was great to have them here and we look forward to having them back in the future.

The Y pre-school/child care and kindergarten children got an opportunity to take a bus ride on the Y buses to visit the local pumpkin patch. Where they were able to ride on a hay-wagon and pick out pumpkins in the field for carving. This was a great trip for them and the teachers, who were able to purchase lots of pumpkins and other Fall stuff for Halloween and Christmas Gifts of Northwest homemade jellies, jams and chocolates. The children, parents and staff look forward to this trip every year!

December saw the start of the new Military Christmas Gift Program which was funded by the Woman's Day Holiday Fund. We had 20 families E-5 and below with 42 children who benefited from Woman's Day Operation Holiday Joy and received a bag full of gifts & gifts cards to a local super market and the Navy Exchange. The Y branch had a Christmas party on December 15th with treats for the children. Santa came in from the North Pole with his new elf (the GEICO Gecko) who assisted Santa in giving out the presents.



Oceanside, California (Camp Pendleton ASYMCA)

During 2007, the Camp Pendleton Branch saw a significant increase in support to our active duty military and their families serving 34,654, an increase of almost 48 percent primarily due to the expanded programs to Marine students at the School of Infantry with free weekly cookouts, income tax assistance, bus transportation, and a recreation center.

The Operation Hero program was expanded in 2007 with the addition of a Little Hero program for kindergarten students in elementary schools on base. The schools and families requested the branch to open Operation Hero for kindergarten children as they have started to demonstrate the stresses of the continued deployments. These deployments have also resulted in an increased participation in the Mommy & Me Preschool program helping mothers and children cope. The assistance to the junior enlisted families in Project Liberty Call significantly increased supporting over 491 families throughout the year.

The summer time programs took a significant jump with summer day camps and athletic camps providing recreational and educational activities to 835 military children from June to August. During Fire Storm 2007, the branch provided commissary gift certificates to 687 families in one housing area affected by the wild fires.

The year concluded with the holiday Secret SANTA program with 690 bikes going to junior enlisted; and local businesses and organizations showing their appreciation for to the military community by sponsoring 905 junior enlisted military families for the holidays.

San Diego, California (San Diego ASYMCA)

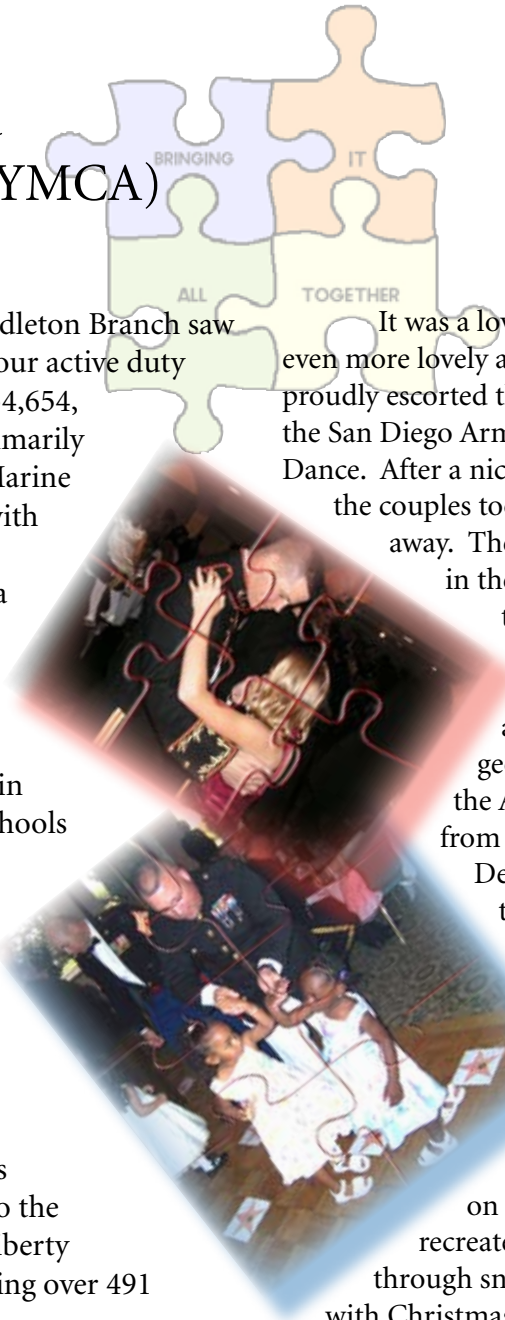
It was a lovely March evening in San Diego, made even more lovely as strong men in their dress uniforms proudly escorted their daughters into the ball room for the San Diego Armed Services YMCA's Father-Daughter Dance. After a nice meal and Waltz Dance Lessons, the couples took to the floor and danced the night away. The smiles on the faces and the twinkles in the eyes told the story. As one daughter told her father on the way home,

“Dad this is the finest night of my life.” The event was extra special for a Chief Boatswains Mate, who was a geographic bachelor in San Diego, when the ASYMCA secretly flew his daughter from the East Coast for the dance.

Deployment separations are, by themselves, stressful. If you couple that separation with Christmas, the holiday becomes a bit empty.

While over 250 military families in San Diego did find 12-25-06 a bit empty because of a deployment, they certainly enjoyed the re-creation of 12-25-06 on June 25, 2007 when the ASYMCA recreated Christmas. Attendees walked through snow into the re-creation center alive with Christmas – music, decorated trees, presents, and food. With the help of San Diego's Mayor (Jerry Sanders), the ASYMCA called seventeen families forward to officially recognize and introduce the seventeen babies born during the deployment. Christmas 2007 for those deployed will be recreated and celebrated on June 25, 2008.

Not even a sudden thunderstorm kept the families from gathering in the ASYMCA parking lot to receive a new backpack full of school supplies. Over 850 backpacks were given to military children. Employees from Waste Management, Inc. delivered the backpacks, set up the tents, and managed the distribution. Assisting were the ASYMCA staff and individuals from radio station 95.7 as well as the San Diego Harley Davidson Dealership.



Twentynine Palms, California (Twentynine Palms ASYMCA)

The year 2007 began with our core programs in full swing. Parent/Child Interactive, Fitness & Fun, Operation Hero, and Kids Care Club continued to be popular. Fallen Hero Program continued to fly family members from all over the country to Twentynine Palms so they could attend Memorial Services sponsored by units returning from Iraq for their son. The Wounded Comrade Program continued helping families to be with their Marine at various base hospitals.

Summer brought changes when our facilities were condemned because of structural damage after a rainstorm. With the help of many, we were able to find temporary locations for our programs and we received a new bus to help with transportation.

Marines in the field were pleasantly surprised to see among the toiletries, candy, paperbacks in the "goody bags" delivered by children in our programs, letters urging them to take care, and thanking them for their service. Here was indeed a win-win situation with the Marines understanding that they were out of sight, but not out of mind; and the children getting the opportunity to relieve some of their anxiety, if not with their fathers, then with someone else to whom they could relate.

The end of the year saw the Holiday Party moved out of necessity. As Santa arrived escorted by Marines and Sailors on motorcycles, those in attendance received gifts, ate cookies and drank punch in a facility that normally sees Marines attending training classes.

Virginia Beach, Virginia (Hampton Roads ASYMCA)

The 2007 year was a very busy, eventful, and successful one in Hampton Roads. We expanded programs and tried new things while continuing to serve our military families in all five services.

The 5th Annual Daddy/Daughter was held at St. Gregory the Great Catholic Church in Virginia Beach. The theme was "Butterfly Kisses" and each girl made a special little memento for their dad.

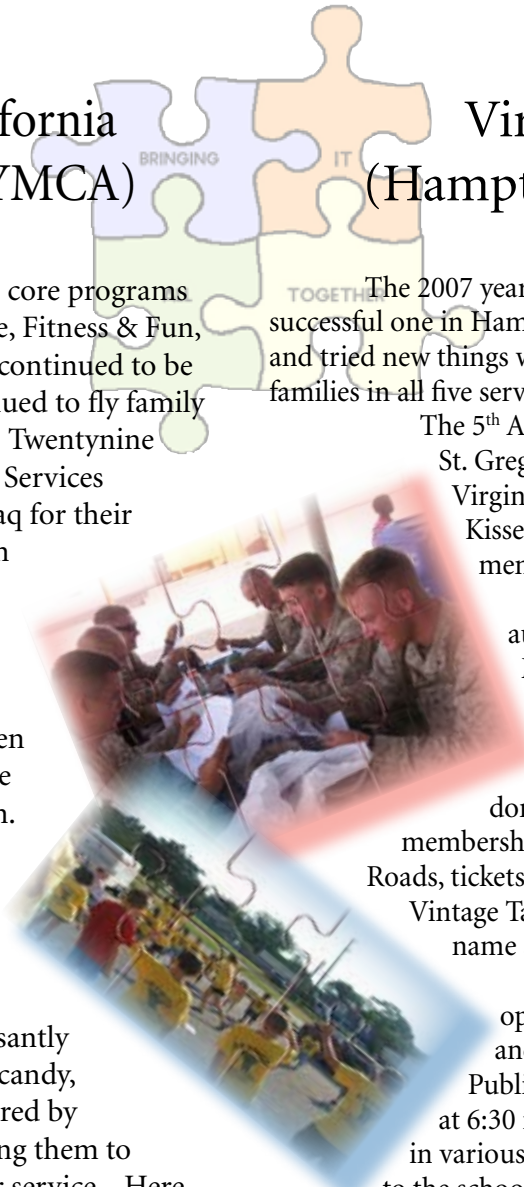
We held our 1st ever live and silent auction at the Norfolk Waterside Marriott on Saturday, June 16th. Our luau theme had guests decked out in their tropical best. We were able to place over 1000 needy toys into the hands of children who wanted to give them a good home. We ended the year as tired, but satisfied that we had helped as many families as we had.
