Altus AFB, Oklahoma (Altus AFB ASYMCA)

Because “A Girl’s First Prom Should Be With Her Daddy!” , we hosted our 8th Annual very popular ‘Daddy and Daughter Valentine’s Ball.’ Our Marriage Enrichment Seminar “Letters from the Heart” for those deployed is a very popular collaboration with the base Chapel, and our “Vernon Lewis Bible Study for Junior Enlisted Airmen” now includes student pilots. We added a Base/City Bus Tour for newcomers; personalized pillowcases are being made for single deployed troops by schoolchildren who also enter our ASYMCA Essay & Art Contests; our very popular “Extreme Bowling for Airmen” and Enlisted Spouses Weekly Social and children’s playgroups are growing. Our train rides are a great success: the Freedom Express Train on 4th of July was FREE for all military families, and local families greeted the train with watermelons, cold drinks and waving American flags, and the Santa Express Train delighted hundreds of military children.

“Feed the Children” blessed us in 2010 with funding for our programs for military family outreach luncheons and fellowship, and Johnny Roberts Motors, our local auto dealer donated a mint condition used Dodge Van to allow us to continue providing transportation for the Airmen against Drunk Driving program which averages a thousand “saves” every year.

Anchorage, Alaska (ASYMCA of Alaska)

2010 was a fun year for the Armed Services YMCA of Alaska. Offering more than 30 programs and services for military members and their families in Alaska keeps us busy, and we wouldn’t have it any other way! Thanks to our volunteers and the thousands of hours they shared with our organization, we were able to serve nearly 120,000 military members and their families.

We experienced an increase in demand since troops redeployed from Iraq and Afghanistan, and we were here to greet them with a hearty “welcome home” and snacks through our Operation Snack Attack program. The 32nd Annual Salute to the Military, brought together the Alaskan business and civilian community with military leadership and local, state, and federal dignitaries to recognize the exceptional service of our enlisted military personnel.

We supported military families through our Teddy’s Child Watch, Food Pantries and the Guardian Angel Program. The Y on Wheels shuttle service post ensures that troops and dependents can get around Joint Base Elmendorf Richardson and Fort Wainwright.

Operation Purple Camp and Camp Camouflage summer resident camps, Operation Hero, and Operation Kid Comfort helped to provide military kids with extra support and coping skills for military life. The annual Father Daughter Dances in Anchorage and Fairbanks and the Mother Son Adventure in Anchorage helped to strengthen the parent child bond.

We even gave away thousands of dollars’ worth of free tickets and other fun giveaways donated by the Alaskan community. These programs and services, among many others, allow us to funnel the support and gratitude that Alaskans have for the military, and we couldn’t do it without their generous support. Each day our ASYMCA of Alaska team wakes up excited to “Serve those Who Serve America” because we get to see the impact this support provides on a daily basis!



Bremerton, Washington (Kitsap Family YMCA)

Big news from the Kitsap Family YMCA! After nearly 100 years of association with the Armed Services YMCA of the USA, Kitsap Family YMCA has made the decision to join the YMCA of Pierce and Kitsap Counties as a branch of their Association in the National YMCA. The long-time connection to ASYMCA was severed as of July 1, 2010.

This was not an easy decision as the Armed Services Y branch has been an essential part of the military fabric of the community for so long. We have appreciated our long association with ASYMCA and all that they have done for our branch over the decades.

However, since the branch moved from just outside the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard gate in 1986, the percentage of our membership that were active Military had been declining and the percentage of our community membership was growing steadily, despite our dedication to serve the Military families in our community.

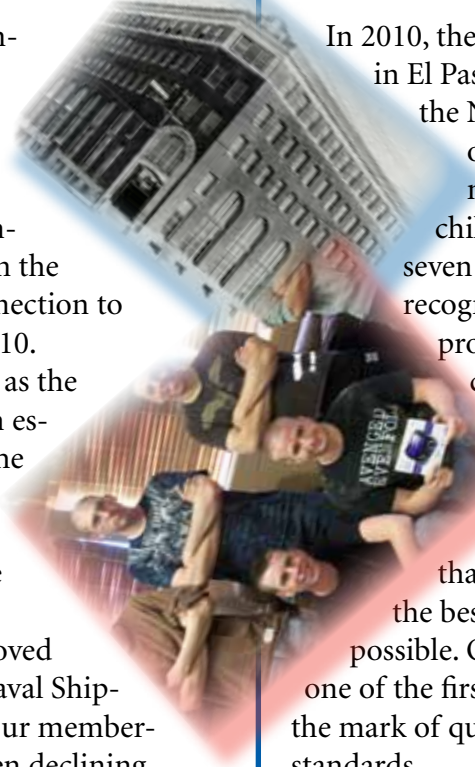


El Paso, Texas (Fort Bliss ASYMCA)

In 2010, the ASYMCA Child Development Center in El Paso again earned accreditation through the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) – the nation's leading organization of early childhood professionals. For the past seven years the El Paso CDC has been recognized through the Texas Rising Star program as a quality child development center, but receiving national accreditation demonstrates an even higher level of standard for the center. NAEYC Accreditation lets families in our community know that children in our program are getting the best care and early learning experiences possible. Our Child Development Center is one of the first programs in the country to earn the mark of quality under the new accreditation standards.

Moreover, El Paso again collected over \$25,000 again this year toward their holiday programs. During the Thanksgiving holiday 1,430 turkeys and food baskets were distributed to Junior Enlisted families. The El Paso branch continues to reach out to Holloman AFB located in Alamogordo, NM, about 90 miles north of El Paso to ensure young airmen families also had a good Thanksgiving.

350 children received toys and stuffed animals during the Christmas holiday and a seemingly endless line of children filed through the ASYMCA Junior Enlisted Family Center located on Fort Bliss to take pictures with Santa, drink hot chocolate and pick out their favorite toys. Our after-school children created a step team and performed during the CDC Christmas party. The children created the team and choreographed their own moves. Some military parents arrived from deployment just in time to watch their child perform. Many parents were amazed how much their child had grown and how involved they were in the After-School program.



Fayetteville, North Carolina (Fort Bragg/Pope AAF ASYMCA)

During 2010, the Fort Bragg/Pope AAF ASYMCA focused on expanding partnerships to assist us in reaching out to more families in need. We invited the Fort Bragg Family Readiness Group Assistants and other key leaders to help us raise awareness of our programs and invite participation. Through these collaborations, not only did program quality improve, but many new programs were conceived.

Spring found us participating in the Survivor Outreach Services (SOS) Community Carnival. The ASYMCA purchased hotdogs, hamburgers, condiments, chips, drinks, etc. for more than 200 surviving family members in attendance. We took part in the Staff Judge Advocate National Crime Victims Rights for the ninth year. Our Mother/Daughter Tea & Fashion Show, Healthy Kid's Day, the Children's Festival, Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon and Military Spouses Conference were well attended, as were the many deployment briefings.

Summer began with Camp Lejeune joining our branch, enabling us to send more than 100 kids from Jacksonville and Fort Bragg to Camp Rockfish for a week of resident camp. Our day camps were filled to capacity and Kids' Olympics once again had outstanding sponsors. Picerne Military Housing chose our branch as their charity of the year.

In the Fall we partnered with the Boys and Girls Club of Cumberland County on a very successful school supply drive. We held our first Beer Tasting/Art Auction, and Duke University generously gave hundreds of tickets to the Army/Duke football game. Barnum & Bailey Circus also gave more than 100 tickets to the circus and the Junior Enlisted Golf Outing had another successful year.

The end of the year was busier than ever with the Great Turkey Giveaway, Holiday Hearts, and gift wrapping at the PX. We received 8,000 boxes for deployed soldiers from The Spirit of Christmas and distributed every one of them. We now solely operate The Bookery, our new and gently used bookstore originally operated in conjunction with the Fort Bragg Area Officers' Spouses' Club. It was a great year, one that could only have been accomplished by the generous donations of our sponsors and partners. Thanks to all of you!

Fort Campbell, Kentucky (Fort Campbell ASYMCA)

From the addition of new playgroups, to our wonderful summer camps and our new Little Heroes program, Fort Campbell Armed Services YMCA had a very busy 2010 taking care of our military families. The year began with over 10,000 Soldiers deployed and by summer we had over 20,000 Soldiers in Afghanistan. The majority of which are junior enlisted Soldiers. Assisting the families left behind with their needs is what we do on a daily basis. Our daily playgroups have grown by leaps and bounds. This gives the young spouses a place to let their children play and make friends.

In early summer we added a new playgroup called Little Lambs. It is a Bible study for preschool children. Our Adult bible study continues to grow even during the deployment. The number of participants is holding steady around 35 each week.

The Backdoor Boutique and our food assistance programs also saw their numbers increase. Around 275 families a week benefited from these services. Families looked forward to our monthly breakfast and family dinners. These events gave them an opportunity to visit with other families and eat a wonderful free meal.

Our newest program, Little Heroes, is very popular. This is a preschool program for 3 and 4 year old children of deployed Soldiers. It is a very structured program that helps prepare the children for kindergarten. We currently have 88 children enrolled.

As we closed out the year, a few of our Soldiers began redeploying. With their return comes a new set of family needs and challenges. We are busy helping them with these needs. Taking care of these families is what we are all about. We ended 2010 having served



Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri (ASYMCA of Missouri)

One of the most obvious changes for year 2010 is our new name. We are now known as the Armed Services YMCA of Missouri. This name change enables us to reach out beyond the Pulaski County area and continue our work with the military families in other areas of Missouri. Our new website: www.asymcaMO.com also reinforces our new vision.

While still on the lookout for a permanent place to “call our own”, we continue to house our “Y” in an office and take our programs and services to any and all locations we can. Our weekly playgroups and craft classes provide Moms and toddlers with a social network, as well as a chance to interact with their children. Story Hours and After School Adventures encompass children from toddlers to grade 6. Monthly bus trips have taken us to the surrounding communities for movies, live performances, zoos and local attractions.

During 2010, we worked closely with the Ft. Leonard Wood Spouses Club, FLW Thrift Shop, the Command Group, and the Association of the United States Army (AUSA). Our Warriors in Town program (Raytheon winner) continues with quarterly support to the Wounded Warriors assigned to the Warrior Transition Unit at the FLW hospital. The Y also provided an afternoon cruise on the Branson paddle wheeler, the Branson Belle, for the Warriors.

Our ongoing, SOS (Service on Saturday) program matches active duty volunteers with community projects. In 2010, we partnered with the Snack in a Pack program to provide backpacks for children to take home each weekend filled with snacks to sustain them until Monday. Over 80 students receive Snack in a Pack each week.

We continue to offer Operation Kid Comfort quilts on the installation. The response has been enthusiastic and we have partnered with quilting groups from surrounding areas all eager to participate and support the troops and their families.

We love camping at Ft. Leonard Wood! During the summer, we sent 50 campers, ages 8-12, to summer resident camp and in November, 30 families (135 people) attended a family camping weekend....all this because of Sierra Club funding.

We participated in a pilot program with Y USA that we named, ASYMCA C.A.R.E.S (Creative Activities to Reinforce Early Skills). The pre-literacy program targets military children who are cared for by family, friends and neighbors in a home environment, outside the licensed, traditional CDC setting.

As always, we strive to promote our branch and our programs and to encourage partnerships that add meaningful benefits for our military children and families.



Honolulu, Hawaii (Honolulu ASYMCA)

2010 brought some changes to the Honolulu ASYMCA. In March we welcomed our new Executive Director Stanley Lum. Stan comes to us with vast experience and the entire organization is excited to have him on board. In order to meet the needs of the community, the preschool is planning on expanding to three separate programs, Preschool, Kindergarten Prep and Advanced Kindergarten Prep. The goal of the program is to give the child skills to be successful in Kindergarten and throughout their elementary years.

In July, we collaborated with EK Fernandez to hold a carnival at the Waipio District Park.

The carnival offers free admission to the public as well as military families. Military families with deployed members had the opportunity to enjoy rides free of charge for four hours on Saturday. The ASYMCA arranged for static displays from all branches of service, manned a booth and helped with the parking. We received \$12,500 for our participation and look forward to a long relationship with their organization.

The summer and fall months we were fortunate to provide camping opportunities for the military families at the YMCA Camp Erdmin. The slots always fill up quickly and are highly praised by all who participate.

We joined forces with Paul Brown Salon and Spas to launch Operation Makeover. The recipient receives a makeover, a shopping spree from Guess clothing, dinner at Roy's of Waikiki and a two night stay at the Waikiki Marriott. We at the Armed Services YMCA Honolulu are touched by the joy this program provides!

We continue with Operation Kid Comfort in giving quilts to the children of deployed service members. Additionally, we help families during Thanksgiving and Christmas with food baskets. During 2010 we were able to assist some 800 families.

All year long we hold special family events to include, the Good Friday Easter Bunny Bash at Barber's Point Stable. Additionally we hold two Father Daughter Dances. This is a formal event with a buffet dinner and an evening of dancing. The Fall Fun-Fest and Breakfast with Santa ended the year.



Jacksonville, North Carolina (Camp Lejeune ASYMCA)

2010 was a year of change for the Camp Lejeune branch! On July 1st consolidated under Fort Bragg. Our goal was to increase awareness of our branch and the quality programs we provide. Throughout the transition, the staff performed in an exemplary and professional manner, forging new partnerships and improving already existing relationships with local organizations.

Our building acquired a more updated look, shedding the worn out cubicle for sleek office furniture and seating area that is brighter and welcoming to all who step in the front door. The staff now has computers and internet service, which is vital for quality programming. Our new website is up and running and has provided a great source of publicity for our programs.

One of our most successful programs this past year has been our Home School Art Classes, which continue to grow each session. Children ages 3 and up participate in learning different art techniques, experiencing a wide variety of art venues. Our Mini Movers playgroup, which explores movement through song and dance, kept parents and children movin' and groovin' with handmade instruments. Dry Brushing 101 and our Make It & Take It sessions helped participants express their creative side, painting ceramic pieces and learning new crafts.

The Backdoor Boutique continued to operate twice a month, serving more than 500 families in 2010. Many thanks for the donations from our sponsors who are responsible for the success of the Boutique. Operation Hero got a late start, but is up and running at full capacity. Our goal is to expand the program to other base schools next school year.

Special events of 2010 included Indoor Outdoor Sidewalk Sale, Ice Cream Party, Aloha Diva Night, Christmas in July, Ceramic Bisque Sale, Little Ghouls & Goblins Pizza and Costume Party, 3rd Annual Car Show, Festival of Trees, Paint the Day Away, Holiday Cookie Decorating, the Great Turkey Giveaway and Holiday Hearts.

2011 looks promising and our list is growing long as we plan additional programs such as Scrapbooking, Sweet-Heart Dance, Mother-Daughter Tea & Fashion Show, Healthy Kid's Day, Summer Scientists, and Crafty Campers.

Killeen, Texas (Killeen ASYMCA)

In 2010, our board kicked off a Capital Campaign to raise funds to build a new ASYMCA facility. Before the official kick-off of the Campaign, the ASYMCA received 1.5 million dollars from the US Housing and Urban Development.

We raised community support in the form of a donation of 15 acres of land from the City of Harker Heights and commitments from local hospitals to form partnerships to help build the facility;

We hosted or sponsored 47 Morale, Welfare, and Recreation events and activities in support of 18,663 soldiers and their families from Fort Hood.

Special events included: YMCA Healthy Kids Day (held in conjunction with the Rotary's Annual Crawfish Boil and Catfish Fry), the Annual ASYMCA Mud Run, a Barbeque for 500 Gold Star Family Members, cooked hot dogs and hamburgers for about 5,000 soldiers and sponsored reunion celebrations for soldiers of our adopted units returning from IRAQ.

Our Before and After School Childcare Program continued to grow. We now have 37 programs in every elementary school covering 5 Independent School Districts. The program has an enrollment of over 1,800 school aged children with an average daily attendance of 1,250.

We developed the ASYMCA's Food and Fun curriculum in our after school programs designed to encourage children and their families to develop healthy eating habits and to lead active lives.

Our Fitness Center opened in September and immediately realized great success. We now have over 400 members. Through our YMCA Activate America and Healthy Family Home Initiatives, we have changed our program environments to provide the experiences, knowledge, skills, and habit development that both children and families need to lead healthy, active lives.

Altogether through all of our programs, special events, and activities, in 2010 we served more than 61,608 youth, teens, active older adults and individuals, and military service members and their families.



Lawton/Fort Sill, Oklahoma (Lawton/Fort Sill ASYMCA)

What an exciting year 2010 was for the ASYMCA Lawton Fort Sill! We were blessed to have Lisa Pratt, 2009 winner of Operation Rising Star (the US Army equivalent of American Idol) perform at our Partner Member Appreciation Breakfast. After her performance of *God Bless America*, there was not a dry eye in the house.

The Lawton High School Art Club donated some wonderful murals for our childcare center. Through a grant from a local foundation, we were able to purchase a new van for our Operation Wheels program that provides free transportation for all military ID holders to doctor's appointments and social welfare needs. We partnered up with a local bank for Operation Care Drop to provide comfort items for Soldiers deployed to the Middle East and collected about 3,000 pounds of items!

We teamed up with YMCAs from across the state of Oklahoma for a clothing drive for our Soldier's Closet which serves approximately 2,500 families annually with free clothing and household items. Our Armed Services Y Fry Special Event continues to be a huge success raising both charitable dollars as well as increased awareness in the community about all the programs and services we provide military families.



Oak Harbor, Washington (Whidbey Island ASYMCA)

Early 2010 saw the entire ASYMCA staff attend the annual Early Childhood Education Conference at Bellingham Technical College in Bellingham, Washington. This conference utilized many different guest lecturers on up to date issues affecting early childhood education which will allow our staff to keep their qualifications up to date in the field.

Of course, March wouldn't be complete without the St. Patrick's Day parade in Oak Harbor for those of Irish decent to celebrate their heritage in the local community. The children love a parade, especially the candy that is thrown out to them by those in the parade. Since many in the area are of Dutch heritage, in April those founding families celebrated their heritage in the local community with their parade. It is also the time for the ASYMCA to hold one of its fund-raisers, the Holland Happening Food Booth a time where staff, parents, and board members raise funds for the ASYMCA programs.

Early Summer is time for graduation of the kindergarten and pre-school classes after along 9 1/2 months of intense educational classes. This year we had 24 children graduating to the next level in their educational lives; 12 in the kindergarten and pre-school classes. The parents love this day so they can take pictures of their child's success receiving their diplomas. The children love getting their diplomas but their favorites are the ice cream, punch and cookies!

Other summer programs are in full swing with many different things going on such as field trips to all the local big parks, Ft. Casey and other interesting local sites. Also the fourth of July Parade, ASYMCA Food Booth and Pancake Breakfast at the Branch are big fund-raisers for us.

Fall brought a return to school as well as Branches' Golf Tournament when about 75 golfers from the local civilian and military communities get together to raise some funds for our programs. The parents, staff and board members provide about 200 pounds of treats for 3 or 4 thousand children, young adults and even some older adults who show up for the two hour event on Pioneer Way.

The Thanksgiving/Christmas holidays saw the Branch giving out monetary assistance and food baskets to families E-4 and below with children. This year we provided \$6000 worth of gift cards to the commissary for E-5 and below families. The funding for this program is provided by the Woman's Day Holiday Fund through ASYMCA National Headquarters.



Oceanside, California (Camp Pendleton ASYMCA)

Since early 2003, Marines and Sailors from Camp Pendleton have continued their exhaustive combat deployments, first to Iraq and now to Afghanistan. The Camp Pendleton branch has developed an extensive array of programs and services that help improve their quality of life and reduced the stresses the families suffer when their service member departs on deployment. Family stress reducers include the Kindertyme Preschool; after school tutoring and mentoring programs Operation Hero and Little Hero; Project Liberty Call that provides short term emergency financial support; Mothers In Transition that provides a structured support group for women who have been screened for potential maternal depression.

The stress reducers for the young Marine students at the School of Infantry include a Recreation Center, Concrete Beach cookouts, Thanksgiving Home Hospitality, Super Bowl, and transportation on weekends. The final group of stress reducers is for the deployed families which include the United Through Reading that ties the deployed service member with their children through books and reading, and a new program, Operation Kid Comfort, that provides a unique quilt to children of deployed service members.

Our other events include the Father Daughter Dance giving over 320 special couples a very enjoyable evening, Ball Gown and Bicycle give a way's, and finally completing the year with our Christmas Secret SANTA program that served over 1,330 families during the holiday.



San Diego, California (San Diego ASYMCA)

With strong community support in 2010, the San Diego Armed Services YMCA reached a record 9,290 service members and their family members each month.

In 2010, our popular Operation Kid Comfort program reached its 3,000th quilt which represents 30,000

volunteer hours! In the words of one young quilt recipient:

“My quilt was made by a quilt fairy, because only fairies can make magic happen!” Our Youth and

Hero and YES! Programs also continued

to be a big hit among military families in 2010, and even received media attention this past summer.

In 2010, over 20,000 wounded, injured and ill patients, along with family members, benefited from ASYMCA programs offered at Naval Medical Center. In total, our dedicated volunteers contributed 26,090 hours to ASYMCA programs- this is equivalent to 12 full-time staff.

The foundation of the Active Duty Program, our Military Volunteer Program (MVP), continued to thrive in 2010 as 1,500 active duty volunteers gave 8,038 hours of their time volunteering within the San Diego community. MVP's greatest success in 2010 was the significant increase in the number of participants who volunteered more than once to MVP. 51% of military volunteers attended multiple volunteer events. Throughout 2010, Family Outreach Social Workers traveled all over San Diego conducting nearly 190 home visits each month.

The Family Outreach Department closed the year by recognizing the efforts of military parents through the SuperParent Holiday Shopping Day.

Thanks to a last minute, generous donation from The Spiva Family Foundation, hundreds of military families were called off of the wait-list and invited to attend. Our holiday programs served an amazing 1237 families!



Twentynine Palms, California (Twentynine Palms ASYMCA)

The Armed Services YMCA of Twentynine Palms continued to meet its mission in serving the active duty and their families in 2010. With continual stressors of deployments on the active duty and their families, providing the active duty and their family with quality programs to connect with each other became more important.

Starting with the Parent/Child Interactive Programs, parents and their infant, toddlers, and preschoolers are able to meet other families during the week, learn new ideas, and participate in field trips.

Continuing with after-school programs, over 128 Kids Care Club's 2nd-6th graders came together to give back to the community by creating gift baskets for Wounded Warriors to making Easter special for children in CPS.

Spring brought smiles and happiness to over 160 spouses who attended the *Heart to Heart Luncheon* with a fashion show, door prizes, entertainment, and inspirational speakers honoring them for all the sacrifices that they must endure during deployments.

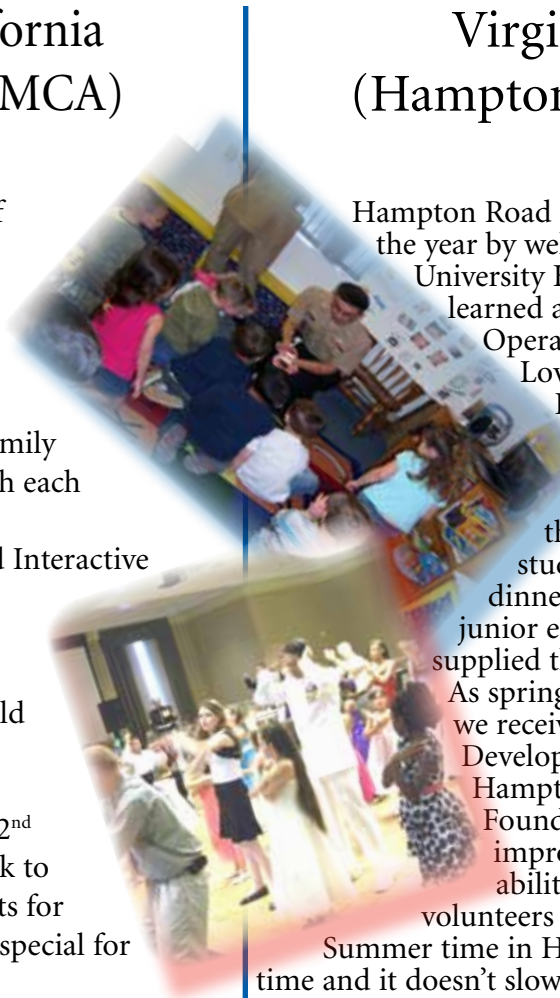

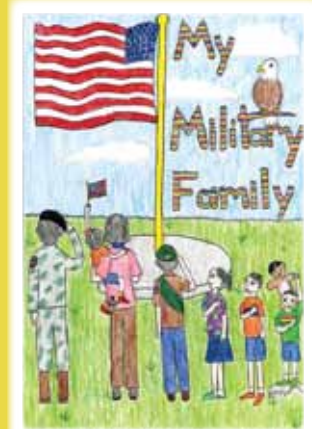

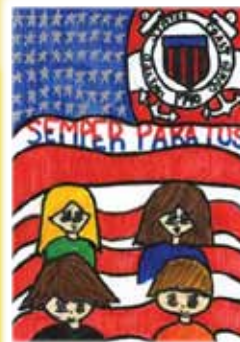

YMCA Military Outreach Initiative

In 2010, The Armed Services YMCA (ASYMCA) continued to administer the Military Outreach Initiative with the Department of Defense (DoD). This program provides eligible military families and active duty personnel with access to youth development, family strengthening, and health and well-being programs through memberships at community YMCAs and some private fitness companies nationwide. Membership fees are underwritten by the DoD and administered through the Armed Services YMCA. The network of over 1,407 YMCAs have provided overwhelming support for this initiative and over 35,000 military families and some 70,000 children were served in 2010.



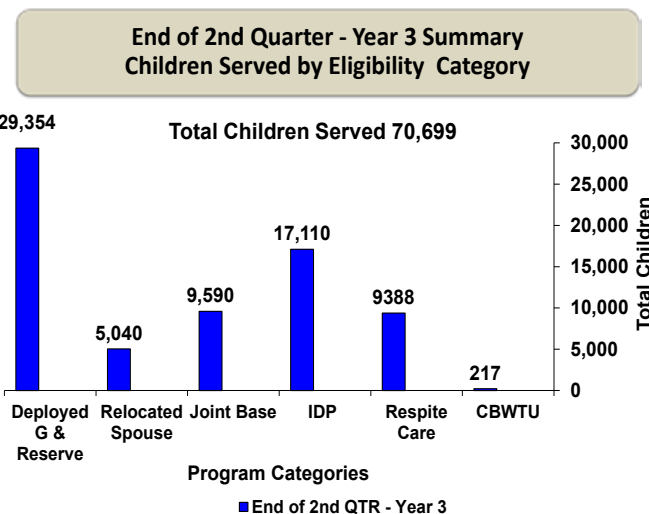
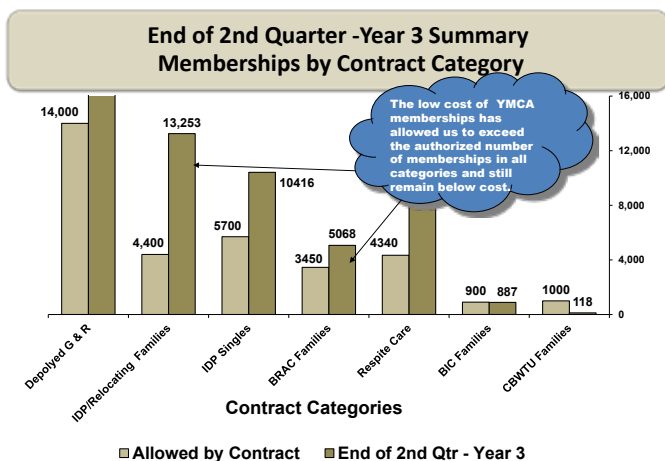
to develop a plan to support military family readiness and to ensure military family readiness programs and activities are available to all military families, including those of the National Guard and Military Reservists.

The ASYMCA-DoD Outreach Initiative grew from a provision in the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008, which requires the Secretary of Defense

The Military Outreach Initiative will continue to run through September 30, 2011 and the contract has a provision for an additional 2 Option Years through 2013.

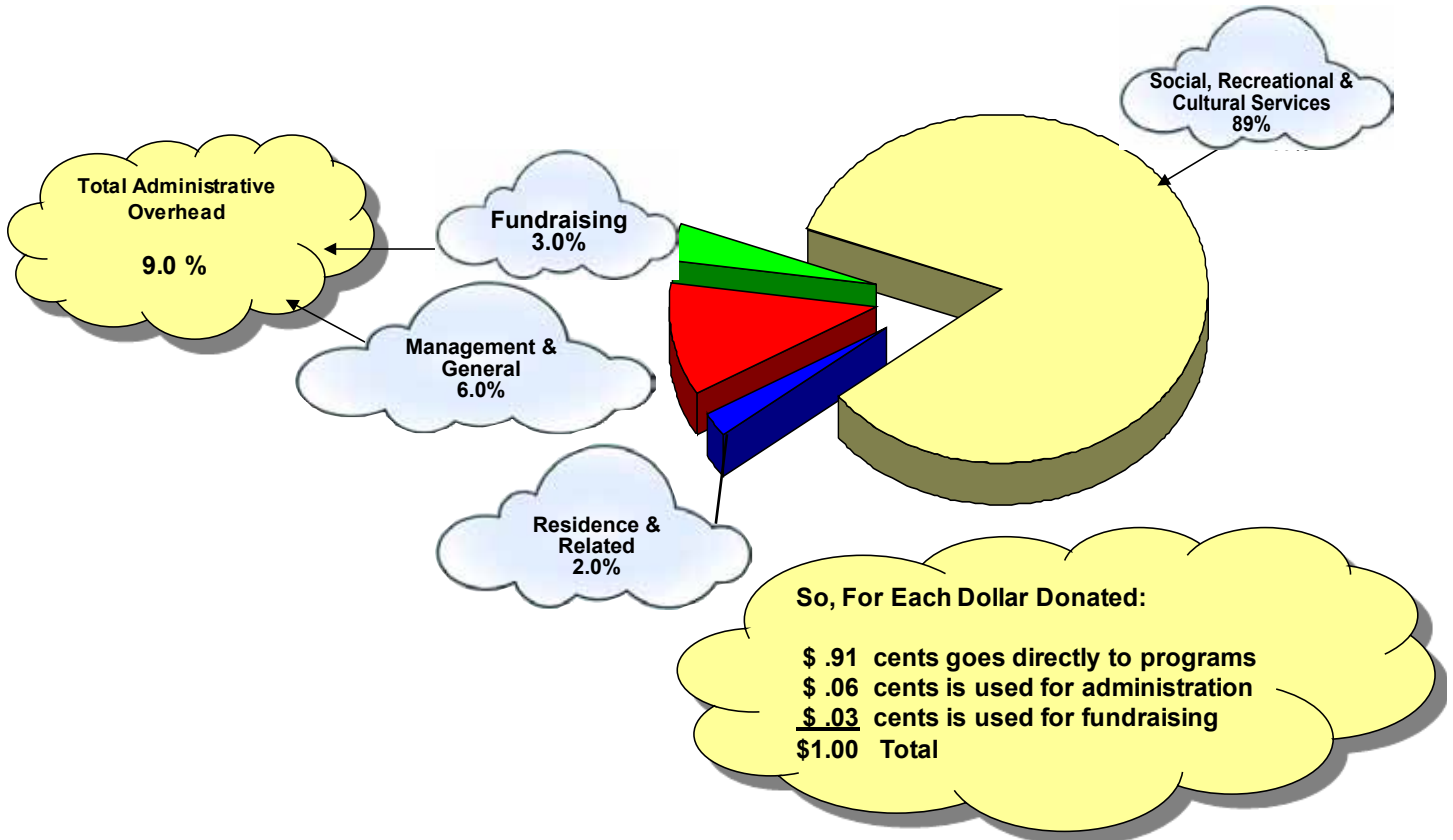

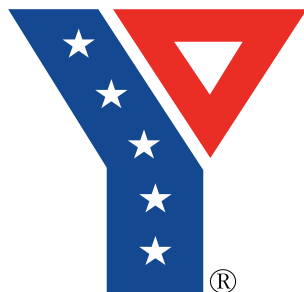
